The warm season without lavender? Unthinkable! The fragrant flowers of the small subshrub start emitting their fragrance in June or July. If you cut off the faded stems at the beginning of August at the latest, you can enjoy a second bloom with a little luck. However, the lavender is not really brought into shape with the pruning shears until spring. The fragrant flowers can be harvested and dried for a soothing tea. On their own or in combination with other soothing dried plants, you can take the scent of summer with you into autumn in an herbal cushion. A mixture of hop blossoms, lavender, melissa, chamomile and thyme, for example, can have a relaxing effect if you are suffering from sleep problems and stress. The body heat releases the effective essential oils.

Can bumblebees actually sting?

Bumblebees are as much a part of summer as ice cream and barbecues. They are beautiful to look at and very peaceful fellow inhabitants of the garden. Only when you really, really harass them a lot, will you learn that bumblebees can indeed sting. And of course they fly – even though their wings

are actually too small to carry them through the air. That doesn't bother the insects. Nevertheless, they buzz from blossom to blossom. The friendly buzzers are tough at that: They start getting busy at six degrees already and also in wet conditions. Bees need signifi-

cantly warmer weather. In unfavorable weather conditions, bumblebees are the ones that prevent a com-

plete crop failure. Unfortunately they are also endangered – like many other insects. If you want to help the animals, you should fill your garden or balcony with flowers.

IN A SMALL SPACE A SNACKING GARDEN FOR GOURMETS

Everyone still knows them: the large vegetable gardens and orchards that once fed families. Today, there is often a lack of time and space for cultivation. But a little snacking garden is possible even in the smallest spaces. Even a balcony can, with the right plants, become a blooming and fruitful oasis. For the snacking garden, we recommend for example different strawberry varieties, including a monthly strawberry which provides aromatic small fruits throughout the summer. Red currants, gooseberries and autumn raspberries also provide a delightful and delicious harvest. And space-saving, robust column apple trees provide the gardener in late summer with tasty fruits that are easy to pick. Besides the indispensable chives and parsley, there is surely still room for spicy herbs like lemon and orange thyme. They go well with scented violets. Enjoy the delightful edible flowers in any salad.

Keep annoying mosquitoes away

They are true tormentors – mosquitoes. They either rob us of our peace with their penetrating buzzing. Or they stab us and plague us with itchy bumps. Numerous household remedies promise

effective deterrence. Try them to see what works best for you! Herbs like basil, chives, lemon balm, peppermint or sage should keep away the pests. A tomato plant on the window sill or

balcony should also serve this purpose. Geraniums and the incense plant, which will thrive in a flower box for example, are said to be extremely unpopular with the annoying fliers.

COLORFUL EVEN IN THE WINTER

Drying hydrangea flowers THE RIGHT WAY

Hydrangeas accompany us through the summer with their beautiful lush flowers. Most species grow best in semi-shade and do not want to be too dry. Some can change the color of the blossoms: They present the coveted blue on rather acid soils. In neutral or more alkaline soil, the blooms turn pink. If you want to decorate your home in winter with colorful hydrangea blos-

soms, you can use glycerin (available at drugstores): Mix 100 milliliters of glycerin in a container with 200 milliliters of water. The flower stems of the hydrangeas remain in the mixture until small glycerin droplets are visible on the bracts. The stems are then dried and will decorate your home with bright colors for a long time.

The longest day of the year

is the day of the summer solstice on June 21. Exactly at noon Central European time, the zenith of the sun will reach the Tropic of Cancer: We will have more daylight hours than on any other day of the year. In northern Germany, longer than in the south by the way. It is hardly known that the solstice can also fall on June 20 or 22, but this happens quite rarely.

Tasty and healthy weeds

For many gardeners, nettles are a weedy nuisance. But the wild plant is extremely tasty and has undreamt-of culinary qualities. Its subtly tart to nutty aroma enriches spreads, pestos, pancakes and risottos. For a side dish, blanch the tender leaves briefly, steam them with onions and add a dash of cream. Collect the leaves in your own garden or at the edge of the forest. Heavy-duty gloves protect against the burning effect. Young plants of about 20 cm are particularly tender and aromatic and healthy: The wild

plant is rich in secondary plant substances, iron, potassium and calcium, soluble silica and vitamins. Stinging nettles are used as medicinal plants for purification, urinary tract infections, rheumatism and gout. For a wholesome tea, pour a quarter liter of boiling water over a tablespoon of fresh leaves and let it steep for five to ten minutes.



ST. JOHN'S DAY THE JUMP ACROSS FIRE

In many rural areas, a large bonfire is lit around June 24, St. John's Day: It is supposed to ward off demons that cause diseases, harm cattle or cause deformities in children. In some places, straw dolls are therefore thrown into the flames. The fire is also supposed to ward off dreaded hail damage in the coming harvest months. In some areas, boys and girls jump over the bonfire. This custom is supposed to protect against diseases. And when a couple jumps hand in hand over the fire, a wedding is soon to be celebrated.

Fairy-Tale King

Shy king Ludwig II built his castle Neuschwanstein in an idyllic location to withdraw from the public eye. But seven weeks after his mysterious death in 1886, the castle was opened to the public and the refuge became a magnet for the public.

Today, Neuschwanstein is one of the most visited castles in Europe and is still fascinating. Like no other building, it bears witness to the ideals and desires of Ludwig II. It was not a place of royal representation, but a place of retreat. The king fled into a dream world here – the

poetic world of the Middle Ages. But this era was only an illusion in Neuschwanstein: The old-fashioned appearance concealed state-of-the-art technology and maximum comforts with hot-air central heating, running water, flushing toilets, telephone connections and windows that were unusually large for that time.

Daily walks or hikes – many people love to exercise in the fresh air when they are on vacation. Could it be possible to take the joy of it into everyday life? It would be good for your health. “Those who manage a brisk walk of only eight minutes every day reduce their risk of cardiovascular diseases by 20 percent,” sports physician Prof. Dr. Martin Halle from the Technical University of Munich explains. After only six to eight weeks, heart function and muscle metabo-


EXCURSION TIP: CRYSTAL WORLDS

Where it glitters and sparkles

From Neuschwanstein in southern Bavaria, it takes less than two hours by car to reach Wattens near Innsbruck where you can experience the Swarovski Crystal Worlds. The sparkling crystals of the company, for which Daniel Swarovski laid the foundation stone with his artistry in cutting, have been impressing people since 1895. Today, the stones dazzle not only on jewelry, accessories and

decorative items, but also on the special Hummel figurines of the Swarovski edition. The Swarovski Crystal Worlds are a world of experiences conceived by André Heller with park, art museum, sales venues and restaurant. In the garden, visitors can marvel at a cloud made of 800,000 crystals. Artists, designers and architects like Brian Eno, Tord Boontje, Niki de Saint Phalle, Keith Haring, Andy

Warhol and Salvador Dalí have interpreted and presented the material crystal in various ways in the museum's 16 underground exhibition rooms. The Crystal Worlds are one of Austria's most visited sights.



lism are improved and vessels became more elastic. It is high time to clear up that widespread error that one must be active for at least 30 minutes in order to achieve positive effects, says the expert.

And movement can do even more: The German Sports University showed that the more older people move in everyday life, the fitter their minds become. In addition, hiking reduces stress and depression and raises self-confidence, as is proven by various studies.

Forest walks seem to be particularly beneficial for health: They not only reduce blood pressure, heart rate and stress levels, but also seem to strengthen the immune system. Researchers suspect that the reason for this is special substances in the forest air that trees emit in order to protect themselves against pathogens and pests.

Discover the Idyllic Alpine Landscape on Foot

A visit to Neuschwanstein can be wonderfully combined with a relaxing hike through the impressive foothills of the Alps. Despite the many visitors to the royal castles, hikers will find peace and quiet between mountains, trees, meadows and lakes not far away.

An attractive route with magnificent views of the castles and the Alpsee (lake), for example, leads from the large car park at the foot of Neuschwanstein up to the picturesque Hohenschwangau castle.

Afterwards, the trail goes down again and circles around the idyllic Alpsee. At the west end, the Mary monument and a beautiful view of Neuschwanstein await hikers. It is in memory of Marie Friederike, the wife of Bavarian King Max II and mother of the fairy-tale king Ludwig II. On the circular lake walk, you can either continue in the direction of the starting point or – if you are more active – return to the car park via Marienbuche, Neuschwanstein and the Pöllat

gorge which, however, is often closed because of falling rocks.

'Tis early practice only that makes the physician: The little doctor is well equipped with a book and a "remedy" in a can to cure the aches and pains of his patient "patients". Children have always imitated what they experienced and saw while playing. Such a scene is captured by this novelty with great attention to detail.

Anette Barth has completely remodeled this elaborate Hummel figurine. For the processing, the master model was disassembled into 16 individual parts which were then artfully assembled again, burned several times and painted rich in detail. The employees of the Hummel Manufaktur handle any figurine about 1,200 times before it is considered to be a perfect "Hummel" that is allowed to leave the factory.

In the Orchard

The little gardener looks thoughtfully at the apple in his hand. I wonder if he's thinking about putting it in the ground with his spade? Maybe a new little apple tree would grow? Master sculptor Gerhard Skrobek designed the little fruit lover in 1984. The figurine is now issued in this form for the first time. It shows a scene that must have been common in earlier times. Because at that time, children in the countryside were certainly expected to help in the house and yard. The home grown fruit harvest played an important role for

the nutrition during the cold season. Particularly long-lasting apples were harvested with great care and stored airily on wooden shelves. They were often the only fresh fruit available in fall and winter. While these storage apples could often only be picked in October, families eagerly awaited the ripening of the "summer apples", also called "corn apples" in July and August. When the stored fruits were used up in spring, the summer harvest ended the "apple-free" period.

Directly from the tree, "corn apples" are wonderfully fresh and juicy and should be eaten quickly. Because they can't be stored and will therefore never make it to the supermarket shelves. But whether they are summer or winter apples: The fruits help to stay in shape. They regulate blood sugar levels, reduce excessive blood fat levels and supply the body with numerous health-promoting substances.

The new Skrobek special edition

In honor of master sculptor Gerhard Skrobek, the Hummel Manufaktur is issuing a series of six special figurines. "Summertime Surprise" kicks off the exclusive special edition. In July already, the little boy with the ladybird will get some company. You can then order "Well Done!" – a figurine with two mischievous looking boys that Skrobek designed in 1973. In the coming years, a collector's figurine from the artistic hands of the well-known sculptor will be issued each year. On his 100th birthday in 2022, the edition will be completed with the sixth figurine.

It is considered to be a lucky symbol and pest controller. Whoever has it in the garden is lucky: The ladybird kills plant lice completely without the use of chemicals. In former times, it was believed that the Virgin Mary had sent the little crawlers which, by the way, supposedly also protected against disaster.

The cute beetles have always fascinated children in particular. Who doesn't like to remember childhood and how wonderful it was to spend time in nature? Out by the stream, climbing trees, watching butterflies, bees, bumblebees or lizards, picking a thick bouquet of flowers or just letting the sun shine on your face? And how beautiful



was it when we met the little red good luck charm? We let it crawl over our arms, fingers and the backs of our hands, before the little bug spread its wings again and flew away into the world. How we would have loved to follow it!

A moment of happiness in a child's life captured

Maria Innocentia Hummel was a good observer of even the smallest details. In her drawing, the Franciscan sister perfectly captured just such a moment of happiness: A little boy with a walking

stick in his hand enjoys the cute insect with seven dots on its back. "Summertime Surprise" is the name of the figurine which master sculptor Gerhard Skrobek, who worked for Hummel Manufaktur since 1946, created for the first time in 1980.



Awareness of art and skilled hands

Gerhard Skrobek was the third in the ranks of the early “M.I.Hummel-sculptors” after Reinhold Unger and Arthur Möller. Born in Silesia in 1922, he soon moved to Berlin with his art-loving parents. He spent hours at the Berlin Zoo as a teenager observing and drawing animals. His decision to turn to sculpture led the young man to the renowned Reimann School, a local private art and craft school. For his further education, he moved to Coburg in 1946 to the then well-known sculptor Poertzel, who shaped many porcelain parts for Goebel. The young Gerhard Skrobek traveled extensively during this



time and had exhibitions in Coburg and Munich. In 1951, the talented artist joined the then W. Goebel porcelain factory and soon became one of the

leading sculptors. In 1954 he was entrusted with the design of the first Hummel figurines. Under his skillful hands, many of the Hummel drawings were transformed into impressive figurines that are still inspiring today. As chief sculptor, Gerhard Skrobek was also responsible for a number of other series of the porcelain factory. To this day, visitors can admire the 1.80 m Merry Wanderer in front of the Manufaktur in Rödentel which he developed for the 100th anniversary of the founding of the Goebel porcelain factory. From 1985 to 1993, Gerhard Skrobek worked as a freelancer for Goebel. He died in 2007 in Coburg.

Collectors and Hummel enthusiasts from all over Germany and even neighboring foreign countries had traveled to revel in the Hummel Paradise. And some fell in love with one or two figurines who then traveled home with them. The Swiss family Müller-Hofmann took on a round trip of 1,200 kilometers in one day to attend the Day of Generations in Rödental. And of course, to add another very special piece to their collection: They had their new acquisition "Sparkling Shell" individually labeled by the painters of the Manufaktur. Things are lively in the salesroom which had been completely redesigned and modernized. Customers were able to shop at reduced prices, get information on the life

of Franciscan Sister Maria Innocentia Hummel in the movie theater and visit the affiliated small museum. And animated shop talk arose in front of many a showcase among connoisseurs of the traditional figurines.

The Hummel workshops were also unusually lively. The employees of the Manufaktur were happy to have people "look over their shoulders" and cheerfully answered all curious questions. Many interested guests looked over the shoulders of the specialists during their work processes and informed themselves about the complicated individual work steps. After all, it can take up to three quarters of a year to produce a Hummel figurine from development to completion. Elena Molter had come to Rödental with her family from near Bamberg and was impressed: "I didn't realize there was so much manual work involved in every figurine. It is unbelievable with how much attention to detail and with how much effort they are painted, for example. How these beautiful colors are used and how this expression is created in the faces – is simply great!"

Resi Schürf from the Traunstein area eagerly photographed especially the slightly larger figurines. "I can't get enough of looking at them. They simply make me swoon," she said. She arrived by motorhome and combined the visit to the Hummel Manufaktur with a short vacation.

In workshops, visitors practiced decorating in the painting department and garnishing an original "Hummel" in the white production department. Garnishing means the wet cleaning and assembling of a figurine. The parts must be carefully "sludged on". Eight-year-old Pia Schreiber and ten-year-old Max Krausa also learned that this is not that easy. Max's mother Anja could, however, give her son valuable tips – after all, she used to work as a ceramics figurine sculptor at the Hummel Manufaktur and used the Day of Generations to stop by her old workplace. Both children were enthusiastically on board.

Although the children in particular were absorbed in their work while garnishing, some mothers could not resist making a deer, a little lamb or a small dog. Body, head

and legs had to be assembled. The work has its pitfalls for the inexperienced, ten-year-old Julian found out: "One of the legs keeps falling off," he remarked. But with a little help from a member of the staff, it finally worked out. With much sensitivity and perseverance, Julian then set about smoothing the "seams" and putting the finishing touches to his little dog. One floor up, the painting workshop was a colorful event: The children gave free rein to their creativity and passion for colors: The

more colorful the better, was the motto of the up-and-coming artists. The deer can turn out yellow-red or green-blue. The shop also saw the birth of some funny spotted brown and white dogs. As an original, albeit not genuine "Hummel figurines", they will now enter the children's room as individual pieces and remind them of their day at the Hummel Manufaktur. "Hummel played a decisive role in shaping life here in Rödental and contributed to the development of our town," Marco Steiner, First Mayor of the Upper Franconian town, said in his welcome to the Day of Generations. There is almost no household in the region without these figurines and everyone knows someone who has worked and made a living here, the head of the city explained. "We are very happy that the production of Hummel figurines will continue. The Hummel Manufaktur is simply a part of Rödental," Marco Steiner stated.

A sausage fried on the traditional "Kühla" is a fine thing: The Franconian delicacy, which is cooked on pine cones for its typical aroma, visibly appealed to the two Franciscan sisters Emanuela and Jutta-Maria at the open day at the Rödental Hummel Manufaktur.

The small delegation from the convent in Sießen, 400 kilometers away, had accepted an invitation from technical plant manager Peter Hohenstein. For Sister Jutta-Maria, it was her first visit to Rödental. After a brief discussion with the plant manager about new products and models that are still strictly guarded followed by culinary refreshments, Sabine Tzscheuschner took the two delegates from the convent on a tour through the Manufaktur.

The colors are defined individually for each Hummel figurine. In the Hummel workshop, the decor developer is mainly responsible for the colors with which the respective Hummel models are decorated. "Our recipes are determined individually for each figurine. We guard the mixture like the apple of our eye," she revealed.

The two Franciscan sisters listened attentively to the expert's explanations for more than two hours. In the painting section, the visitors learned that each painter uses her own spatula to mix the paint. Sabine Tzscheuschner has been using her tools for over 35 years. "It's irreplaceable," she says and explains: "I will not give it up."

At the interactive stations in the white production section, which

had been set up for the visitors for the Open Day, Sister Emanuela had the opportunity to practice the so-called "garnishing". She chose a lamb to match the Easter period. The Sister put the individual parts together in an experienced manner. The guest from Sießen explained that her dexterity comes from her previous experience with pottery. "I would hire her," Steffi Metz praised her "trainee" from the convent.

How It All Began

A new exhibition at the Hummel Museum in Massing shows a cross-section of Berta Hummel's entire artistic work. Previously unknown works will also be on display.

Art enthusiasts will get their money's worth from the new exhibition at the Massing Hummel Museum, as will lovers of the Hummel figurines: From May 18, a cross-section of Berta Hummel's entire artistic work will be on view – starting with the first drawings of the toddler to her studies at the Academy of Applied Arts in Munich all the way to the paintings that were created after her entry into the Franciscan convent in Sießen that went on to serve as models for the world-famous Hummel figurines.

For the first time worldwide, the first six originals will be shown which were used as models for the

well-known merit reward cards. Of these, the first copies of the publishing houses "Ver Sacrum" and "Verlag für christliche Kunst München" will be on display. Small merit reward cards with English, French and Dutch texts are also on display. Also on display are pictures of the artist's dress and profession, for example, as well as her memorial images and previously not shown prints.

In 1994, the Berta Hummel Museum was opened in the family's former living quarters. The 22nd exhibition will present some unknown works as well as the first Hummel figurine to the public. Berta Hummel originally wanted

figurines to be only terracotta or white. However, the W. Goebel porcelain factory, the former manufacturer of the Hummel figurines, convinced her that only colored figurines could be sold. A few years ago, the museum managed to acquire the first Hummel figurine, a terracotta Merry Wanderer. In the exhibition, he can be seen next to a white Merry Wanderer and a black one from the Zeitgeist series.

The Berta Hummel Museum houses the world's largest collection of Hummel figurines with more than 3,000 specimen, about 500 of which can be seen in the entrance area of the museum.

Where Queen Victoria

As a classic, the “Merry Wanderer” enjoys unbroken popularity. The lovable journeyman now takes his friends and followers on a journey (through time) through his romantic homeland. First stop: Rosenau Castle in Rödental – The favorite castle of Queen Victoria of England.



Most Liked to Be...

Our merry wanderer is something very special. It is not only a collector's item in the showcases of lovers and admirers of exquisite figurative ceramics, but also an imposing original about two meters high in front of the main entrance of the Manufaktur in Rödental. The artist Gerhard Skrobek, who worked for the com-

pany as a sculptor since the 1950s, was responsible for this. A special material and lime paint ensure weather resistance.

Just a stone's throw away from the traditional company is another overgrown Merry Wanderer. It looks out from a small hill onto the neighboring hills lined by meadows and forests and the fa-

mous Rosenau Castle and is considered a landmark of the town of Rödental. The little boy has determinedly grabbed his bundle, shouldered his umbrella and, singing a merry tune, gone out to explore the famous sights around his birthplace. So lets follow him!

First of all, the lively wanderer walks into the historical landscape

park of the Rosenau, which is designed according to the English model and still covers around 36 hectares today. A short tour is especially worthwhile in spring and summer: In the park there is the romantic swan lake surrounded by weeping willows and the little Prince pond, which feeds a specially constructed rock grotto and a waterfall and is picturesquely entwined by ferns, as well as the orangery and remains of the Hermitage. An impressive chestnut avenue leads to Rosenau Castle.

When approached from the south, the castle presents itself from its best side. Idyllically situated on a small rise and flanked by stately trees, it looks down on the eager wanderer. After 1805, it was owned by the dukedom of Coburg. In 1819, Franz Albert August Karl

Emanuel von Sachsen-Coburg-Saalfeld, Duke of Saxony, was born at Rosenau Castle. 21 years later, he married his cousin, British Queen Victoria.



"If I were not who I am, my real home would be here," Victoria raved about Rosenau Castle and Park in her diary.

For Victoria, it was love at first sight: "It was with some emotion that I beheld Albert – who is beautiful."

The Queen noted these words in her diary after meeting the handsome prince on October 10, 1839. Victoria's favorite uncle King Leopold I of Belgium arranged the marriage with the educated and handsome Albert. A

small portrait of the Duke, enclosed in a handwritten letter, aroused Victoria's interest. The marriage was extremely hap-

py: The Queen, who had enjoyed a German education in her youth, bore her husband nine children.

The couple also enjoyed visiting Albert's

home in Rödental. The pair stayed in Rosenau a total of seven times. Away from the strict court ceremonial in England, Victoria and Albert were happy: On the romantic banks of the river Itz, the queen even had her own private bathhouse near her favorite castle.

Prince Albert was very progressive and shaped the modern world: In 1851, he organized the first world exhibition in London and laid the foundation for the water supply and sanitary facilities in workers' homes. He is also thought to be the one who brought the tradition of a decorated Christmas tree to England – with mouth-blown glass balls from the neighboring Lauscha in Thuringia.

He was a loving father to his nine children and an irreplaceable advi-



sor to his wife. When he died at Windsor Castle at the age of 42 after 22 years of marriage, Victoria was inconsolable. "My life as a happy one is ended ..." she wrote to her uncle Leopold. Albert's room remained untouched; for years the queen had the washing water prepared for him every evening and visited Albert's birthplace several more times.

Today, Rosenau Castle is a museum owned by the Free State of Bavaria and open to the public. You can visit the imposing marble hall, which is lined with stucco marble and in which Prince Albert was baptized, as well as the blue drawing room. In nearby Schwanensee, black mourning swans can be seen from March onwards, which arrived in the park at the suggestion of Queen Victoria.

With a wave of his umbrella, our wanderer says goodbye. He will soon continue his hike. We will tell you about this in the next issue of the Hummel-Post.

Happily on the road for decades

The Merry Wanderer was one of the first Hummel figurines ever made. Sculptor and porcelain modeler Arthur Möller made the cheeky fellow come to life in 1935 as a figurine sculptured from a drawing of famous Franciscan sister Maria Innocentia Hummel. The artist selected around 40 figurines from her harmoniously colored illustrations for the first production, including the "Merry Wanderer" as number 7.

Today the figurine is available in different sizes between 4.00 inches and as "Jumbo" with 32.00 inches. HUM 7 and HUM 11 have the same appearance.

In Rödental, a six-foot Merry Wanderer, designed by Gerhard Skrobek, welcomes visitors to the Hummel shop and the Manufaktur. Not far from there, a "colleague" looks out into his homeland from a small rise. In addition, in Staten Island, New York, another oversized Hummel wanderer can be admired: He has invited guests to a Bavarian restaurant since 2014.

Merry Wanderer

The "Merry Wanderer" is a very well known figurine created by Arthur Möller in 1935. It was produced in more sizes than any other Hummel figurine. Special figurines have no buttons or six or seven on the vest.

The castle and landscape park with swan lake, grotto and other sights as well as a glass museum are only a few minutes' walk from the Manufaktur.

“I could look at them for hours”

Once infected with the passion for Hummel figurines, many lovers of the enchanting creatures cannot get rid of the collecting fever. The Hummel-Post went to visit the Weißbrodt couple in Regensburg, who opened their showcases and talked about their enthusiasm for Hummel figurines.

Did the father have any idea what he would trigger with the Christmas present to his daughter Rosi? 30 years ago, he gave her a beautiful angel with a candle and Rosi Weißbrodt was infected with Hummel fever. Today, she and her husband Helmut have lovingly decorated more than 500 figurines in showcases and cupboards in their apartment in Regensburg. And they enjoy the little treasures every day: “They all have such beautiful faces.

You can really fall in love,” Rosi Weißbrodt laughs and fetches a couple of children on a sledge (“Winter Days”) from the “winter shelf” of their collector’s showcase. “I can’t get enough of looking at the characters,” says the Hummel lover as she looks at the “Letter to Santa Claus” with a smile.

Husband Helmut loves decorating

While it is usually the women who enjoy decorating the apartment, here it is husband Helmut who takes care of the Hummel figurines presentation and the decorations for Christmas, Easter and other occasions. "I still love doing that. After all, I was a professional decorator in department stores for many years," he explains. And has thus also contributed his share to the constantly growing treasure of Hummel figurines: "I was sort of at

the source, because we sold Hummel products at our store," he says. This freed him from the worries of many husbands to find suitable gifts for his beloved. Helmut Weißbrodt knows that a Hummel figurine is always the right thing for his Rosi.

He used to design showcases with a love for detail and many ideas. These days, his wife is delighted when he decorates the apartment in winter with star-covered fabric and lights and, of course, many Hummel figurines. On the table in the living room, angels put you in a festive mood.

"The crib is uniquely beautiful"

Helmut Weißbrodt sets up the Hummel crib on a small cupboard during the Advent season. "It is my favorite part and uniquely beautiful," the 63-year-old says. Even the two young, still lively cats show respect: "They leave the crib alone; but with everything else we must be careful that they do not knock over anything," he wonders.

Even in retirement, the fever of collecting has not let them go: "We are always happy when something new comes out and we buy what we like spontaneously," says Helmut Weißbrodt. The childless couple already knows what they are going to do with this impressive collection: The animal lovers already support the animal sanctuary Gut Aider-

bichl with animal sponsorships. The Hummel figurines will be donated to this organization.

Of Shapes and ... and a loving look at every little detail

When the sculptors have put the finishing touches to their work, the viewer is already faced with a real Hummel figurine. Only the color seems to be missing in the dark gray clay model. But before a new "Hummel child" leaves the factory, the craftsmen in Rödental still have many hours of work ahead of them. Because producing thousands of copies of the master model calls for model and mold makers, among many others. We have "looked over their shoulders".



Don't worry, the "Three Little Wanderers" on the right are yet to be painted with the typical warm Hummel colors. The motif was first used by Sister Maria Innocentia around 1938 in an oil painting for Father Wilhelm Renz, the founder and director of the Emmausheim for the homeless.



Figurines



1. Embedded in clay

Nicole Stöbel is designing the clay bed for the little head of one of the little wanderers here. It will then be wrapped in a sleeve, oiled and doused with liquid gypsum. This half mold still has to be recut, smoothed and provided with so-called "locks". The notches and fixing pins prevent the two halves of the mold from slipping later on. The second half mold is produced in the same way. This is how the first master mold and in principle also the following working molds are created.

2. Why the head is missing

Already easy to see: This will become one of the three wandering boys – still "headless" here. The sculptors have put many, many hours of work into the master model. However, as a whole no useful mold can be built with it. That is why it is cut up into its individual parts. "It is pretty exciting when you cut up the master model," employee Nicole Stöbel says. But nothing has ever really been broken. Together with the sculptors, the mold makers consider where the figurine can best be cut. Often the head is cut off, as here with one of the little wanderers (HUM 927) – a new figurine, which will be available from July on. The more detailed the figurine, the more pieces are created. The elaborate Sister's Children (HUM 2288) is made up of 58 parts. In the case of the "Three Little Wanderers", there are 31 individual parts for which



the master molds as well as the working models and molds have to be created for the foundry.



3. With attention to detail

Peter Dreßer proves his eye and his knack for very fine details as a “retoucher” and the great precision in design and expression for which the Hummel figurines are famous worldwide: “The face and eyes must be even and expressive and the lips clearly defined,” he says. He also focuses on the hair, the proportions of the fingers and the finely worked ears, for example. He smoothes uneven spots and makes sure that angles and projections match, so that the traveling boy he has on the table can later carry his backpack. Every single part of the respective figurine requires his skill. “I am eradicating the teething problems, so to speak,” he says. Tiny signs help to correctly assemble the individual parts during further processing. Peter Dreßer also has to bear in mind that the glaze will later take away details and ensure that the handling in the foundry runs smoothly.

4. The exception in green

There she lies in light green synthetic resin: the current club figurine “Housecleaning: Boy with Broom”. For figurines produced in larger quantities, this material is used for the molds in place of the usual plaster. Unlike plaster molds, which become less and less precise with increasing use, synthetic resin lasts longer.



5. “I like the fine-tuning.”

Ronja Heumann is an industrial ceramist in the field of process engineering. As a junior model and mold maker, she is currently working on the retouching of the signpost for the “Three Little Wanderers” figurine. Here she is working on the grass at the base of the stand. “I like this fine-tuning a lot,” she says.





6. For a secure footing

Yvonne Hofmann shows the molds for the pedestal on which the figurine will later be safely standing.



7. Ready for the foundry

Yvonne Hofmann smooths the working forms. When the plaster has set for about 20 minutes, the sharp edges are broken for safety reasons. "Within the mold making department, we always swap activities so that it doesn't get monotonous," she says. With the help of the working molds, the individual parts of the figurines are cast in the foundry. The liquid casting compound washes out the plaster and after a while the contours become blurred. The working mold is then exchanged for a new one which can be recast from the working model at any time.



Dear Mrs. Miller, Mr. Miller – thank you very much for taking the time to answer our questions!

With your fantastic Miller Price Guides you have made history for Hummel figurines and the Hummel Manufaktur. Collectors all over the world appreciate your expertise and the interesting information about Hummel figurines that you have been providing over so many years.

How did you come to this extensive knowledge? What attracted you to the figurines?

Our hobby started after our first tour to Europe in 1964 and visiting the German town of Rothenburg and seeing all the Hummel figurines along with the interesting German

culture. We purchased a few figurines as gifts as well as a few for me. Shortly after arriving home I decided to write to the shop and order a few more figurines as I thought I might just like to start collecting these little cuties! I ordered several times and received every one and I just fell in love with them. All of a sudden, Bob asked me to order one just like one I already had, but in a larger size. If you had an idea for a new figurine today, what would it be?



Salmon fillet with asparagus-potato salad

INGREDIENTS for 4 portions

4 pcs. salmon fillet (deep-frozen, at 125 g)
 500 g smaller waxy potatoes
 500 g green asparagus
 1 bag of ready-made Sauce Hollandaise
 25 g butter
 50 g salad cream
 1 tbsp light balsamic vinegar
 Salt, pepper
 1 tbsp lemon juice
 2 tbsp oil
 2 tbsp cut chives

PREPARATION

1. Allow the salmon fillets to thaw. Cook unpeeled potatoes in salt water, drain, peel and quarter. Peel the lower third of the asparagus, cut off the ends and cut them diagonally into 3 cm long pieces. Cook in boiling salted water for about 10 minutes. Drain the asparagus in a sieve and rinse with cold water.
2. Stir Hollandaise sauce into 1/8 l cold water. Bring to a boil while stirring. Stir in the butter on a low heat until it melts. Remove the sauce from the heat and let it cool down a little. Stir in the salad cream and vinegar. Add the asparagus and potatoes and season to taste with salt and pepper.
3. Sprinkle salmon fillets with lemon juice, salt and fry in hot oil. Sprinkle the asparagus-potato salad with chives and serve with salmon fillets.

Hummel up Close

24-year-old Carina has got a tattoo of her grandmother's favorite Hummel figurine.

The grandmother had tears of emotion in her eyes and the grandfather has become a little enthusiastic about tattoos since then – because Carina, the 24-year-old granddaughter of the two seniors, got a very special motif in their honor: Her left shoulder is unmistakably adorned with a picture of the Hummel figurine HUM 196 “Telling Her Secret”, skillfully placed in front of a violin.

figurines,” she says. She admires the filigree, expressive design and the special charm of the figurines that remind her of her childhood. Carina sat for almost seven hours in the Nuremberg studio “Tattoo Passion”, where tattoo artist Amy Grey put the image of the violin and the Hummel children on her skin. “The violin was quickly finished,” says the 24-year-old. The picture of the Hummel figurine she brought into the studio, on the other hand, took a long time because of the many colors. “The motif was completely new for the tattooist, but she really got it right,” she says happily.

“Everybody loves their Hummel figurines”

Joffrey Streit as Brand Ambassador Germany moves Hummel figurines into the public eye. His heart's desire: Reigniting the Hummel fever! He writes about his experiences here.



My first cautious stock taking as brand ambassador for the Hummel Manufaktur is very positive. I have good and likeable colleagues who, together with owner Bernd Förtsch, are highly motivated in their work. During the first few weeks of my term, I also met pleasant Hummel friends from Germany, neighboring countries and the USA. They all love “their Hummel figurines”. Moreover, these small figurines have a permanent place in the lives of collectors from all over the world.

It is amazing how much joy these little boys and girls with their lovely faces bring to people. Even after 83 years of tradition, Hummel figurines have lost none of their attractiveness. On the contrary: Especially in these fast-moving times, the Hummel figurines convey a piece of an “ideal world”. Taking a longer look, I think the figurines even take the stress out of everyday life.

“Let’s sing” Says Goodbye

The little bandoneon player is no longer issued

What might this trio sound like? The clear child’s voice, the expressive bandoneon and the cheerful chirping definitely form an attractive combination. Master sculptor Reinhold Unger designed the enthusiastic little singer Heini with his instrument in 1938. After many decades during which it found its way into countless apartments, this Hummel figurine is no longer being reissued. Get yourself one of the last specimens!

The bandoneon is known today as the typical Argentine tango instrument. But in the first decades of the 20th century, the “squeeze box” developed into an extremely popular musical instrument in Germany. In the 1930s, the bandoneon was one of the basic instruments of dance and entertainment bands.

It was a popular mood setter for Polkas and Ländler. Because the bandoneon was easy to learn: Musicians did not need to be able to read music. They played according to a series of numbers, a so-called “clothesline system”. And even completely without instructions, it obviously gave children pleasure to elicit a melody from the instrument. In 1920, there were supposedly more bandoneon associations in

Germany than football clubs, especially in the Ruhr area, in Saxony and in Hamburg. The Swiss also loved the instrument. During the Nazi era, the boom ebbed away. After the war, the production facilities in the east German Erzgebirge (Ore Mountains) were cut off from the west. Although there were still many bandoneon clubs

after 1950, in which mainly ensembles of four played together. In West Germany, however, the accordion gradually replaced its little brother.
